First you will learn about the types of waste that are most commonly stored in your home and placed in bins outside of your apartment or house. These include regular waste or Restmüll in German, paper waste or Altpapier in German, package waste or Leichtverpackung in German, and organic waste or Biomüll in German. <p>On-Screen Text:</p> <p>Title: Types of Waste</p> <p>Subtitle: Click a card to learn more.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Card 1: Regular waste (Restmüll) / ON THE FLIP SIDE: The waste in this bin should include non-recyclable household waste, such as food-soiled items (if not suitable for composting), diapers, sanitary products, and certain types of packaging that cannot be recycled.• Card 2: Paper waste (Papiermüll) / ON THE FLIP SIDE: You should recycle clean paper products, such as newspapers, magazines, cardboard, office paper, and cardboard packaging in blue paper bins.• Card 3: Package waste (Leichtverpackung) / ON THE FLIP SIDE: You will either recycle plastic waste in a special yellow bag (GELBER SACK) you can get at most stores or in a plastic yellow bin outside of your home. Plastic packaging, such as bottles, containers, yogurt cups, plastic bags, and wrappers marked with recycling symbols, go in this bin.• Card 4: Organic-biological waste (Biomüll): ON THE FLIP SIDE: Food scraps, fruit and vegetable peels, coffee grounds, tea bags, eggshells, and garden waste, such as grass clippings and small branches, go into the brown or green organic waste bins. Food in this bin does not have to be labeled as organic; rather, it just needs to be organic matter.

<p>User Hears:</p> <p>Next you will learn about the types of waste that are recycled or disposed of in places outside of your home. These include glass waste or Altglas in German, deposit bottles or Pfand in German, bulky waste or Sperrmüll in German, and other waste that goes to a special recycling center called a Wertstoffhof. Click on each card to learn more.</p>	<p>Assets on Screen:</p> <p>Title</p> <p>Four cards, each with an image representing glass waste, Pfand, bulky waste, and waste that would go the Wertstoffhof (building materials and electronics).</p> <p>On the flip side of the cards, text will be included</p> <p>Prev and Next button</p>
<p>On-Screen Text:</p> <p>Title: Types of Waste</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Card 1: Glass waste (Altglas) / ON THE FLIP SIDE: Glass waste (Altglas) bins are found throughout communities. There will be three bins available to sort white, brown, and green glass. You should recycle glass jars and bottles here. Be sure to clean them first!• Card 2: Deposit bottles (Pfand) / ON THE FLIP SIDE: When you buy most plastic bottles, some glass bottles, and aluminum cans, from the store, you will pay a deposit, called Pfand, for those items. After enjoying your beverage, you bring your deposit bottles to a store with a deposit bottle recycling area or machine. (Show read more button) Upon returning deposit bottle, you will be given a receipt for the total number you returned, which you can then apply to the total of your next shopping trip or have cashed out from a clerk. You will be able to determine if the bottle is a "Pfand" bottle by looking for this symbol on the back of the container. (Show Pfand label)• Card 3: Bulky waste (Sperrmüll): ON THE FLIP SIDE: Bulky waste (Sperrmüll) includes larger items that don't fit in your regular waste bin, such as furniture, mattresses, and electronics. You can schedule a special pickup of these items with your local waste management company. Simply put your items in front of your home or apartment building, and they will be picked up on the arranged day. These items will be properly disposed of and recycled when possible.• Card 3: Recycling center (Wertstoffhof) / ON THE FLIP SIDE: For all other types of waste, you can visit a nearby recycling center (Wertstoffhof). Simply bring your waste in a vehicle to one of these centers and put them into the correct bins for recycling. This includes things like construction waste, old wood and metal, paint cans, yard waste, and small electronics (CLOTHES AND BATTERIES). Be aware that most of these recycling centers only allow one visit per day.
